Course Description:

Long term coastal sustainable management requires the recognition of the multiplicity of actors, knowledge, disciplines, interests, competences, and of their effective integration in collaborative settings for implementation of action strategies. The course will start with a detailed presentation of several case studies exploring different dimensions of sustainability. These presentations will focus on the human component and allow for extensive debate of the process and results.

Afterwards, the participants will be introduced to key concepts and will have the opportunity to obtain hands on experience on structuring and operationalizing the involved process dynamics through various exercises and complex simulations. Tools will be proposed to enable participants to elaborate adequate process designs for specific objectives and products, generating successful group dynamics for collaborative solutions.

Course Structure:

Key concepts of Agenda 21 and public participation / Case studies and extensive debate / Methodologies for collaborative decision making / Exercises / Practical examples

Activities:

The attendants will be involved in exercises leading to a deeper understanding and clarification of the key concepts and more adequate forms of the use of the methodologies taught in this course.

A CD with the documents for the course will be given to the attendants.

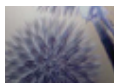
